Proof of Light



On January 6 Christians celebrate Epiphany, when the Magi came to worship baby Jesus. Epiphany, which means an appearance or manifestation, symbolizes the first recognition of the Savior by non-Jews. Because Epiphany also is a reminder that Jesus came as the light of the whole world, its symbols include light, candles and a star.

How did the wise men know — and how do we know — that Jesus is the light of the world? As preacher George Buttrick said, "It would little avail to ask how we know. That would be like asking how we know that Beethoven's 'Hymn to Joy' is joyous. If a man were to say, 'It is not joyous to me,' he would not condemn the music; he would tell only his morbidness. There is no logic to establish an axiom, for an axiom is the basis of all logic; and the soul of Jesus has axiomatic truth. Jesus is light, and there is no proof for light except light itself."

From the Minister of Music

January 1 - A Service of Lessons and Carols

How can we possibly sing all of those wonderful Christmas hymns, when there are only twelve days to sing them, and only two of those days are Sundays? As Lutherans we want to keep singing, it is our tradition, how else can we continue to celebrate the Incarnation in song? Well, that's easy, Lessons and Carols of course!

On January 1, in place of our regular communion service, we will have a single service of Lessons and Carols, which will trace the saving power of God's promise of redemption from the Old Testament prophecies through the Christmas story.



What exactly is a Lessons and Carols service? There is actually a specific format for this service of nine lessons, and a history to the service. It began in the late 1800's in England where the Right Reverend Edward White Benson, Bishop of Truro, held the first service of lessons and carols on Christmas Eve in 1880. He was concerned about the amount of alcohol consumed in the local pubs and wanted to give the people an alternative to spending Christmas Eve in the pub.

Singing carols in church at the time was something of a new idea, Christmas music was separated into hymns, which were acceptable in church, and carols, which had a more secular nature, which were not permitted in church. As the line between what is a hymn and what is a carol became more obscure, carols were permitted in worship around this time. Even though the idea had been around, the traditional service of Nine Lessons and Carols gained it's popularity in the format used by King's College in Cambridge. The Rev. Eric Milnar-White, chaplain of the college, was just back from a military chaplaincy during World War 1 in 1918. The savagery of the war, and what he had seen, affected him deeply. He wanted to establish a special Christmas gift for the city of Cambridge, where they could mourn the loss of the young men killed or injured in the war, and also to establish a service where the simple beauty of Christmas could shine through and attract those who may have lost their faith by either serving in the war, or seeing the atrocities of it.

Going back to the order of service first done in Truro, Rev. White established the service that we will use on January 1. The service is beautiful in it's simplicity, it is done without sermon, or communion. The traditional nine lessons begin in Genesis and trace God's promises to his people; the lessons take us through the Annunciation by Gabriel to Mary, and then the Christmas story, complete with Wise Men. It ends with John's wonderful prologue to his Gospel.

The King's service is usually done with choir singing anthems as well as some congregational hymns/carols. On January 1, we will all be the choir as each lesson comes with a carol that ties in to it. It has been said that the simplicity of this service reminds us that no matter how much humans can mess up the world, God has a plan of redemption for it.

In Cambridge, the chance to see this service in person is very difficult, people have been known to sleep overnight outside waiting for a chance to get in. Though the thought of having a line to get into church is nice, you do not need to reserve a seat to sing all of your favorite Christmas hymns and carols. From the Board of Stewardship

New Year's Day is a celebration of the past and the future. We take stock of the past with thanksgiving and sometimes even relief (that it's over), and we look to the future in hope and anticipation, and perhaps with some worry, for what it holds.

The point is that New Year's celebrations remind us of who we are as opposed to who we would like to be, what we have done in comparison to what we want to do. It reminds us of our accomplishments, but mostly it reminds us of our failures. What we've lost. Who we've lost.

New Year's is our own version of Charles Dickens' classic, A Christmas Carol. And we all play Scrooge. We are visited by the ghosts of our past, present and future.

St. Paul writes: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in .his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, 'He has distributed freely, he has given to the poor; his righteousness endures forever.' He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God." (2 Cor. 9:6–15)

The Lord will both supply and increase what we need to give to the church for its work. This work God does in us will enrich and bless us in every way. With this in mind, here is some practical advice to help take stock of our giving in years past and change what needs to be adjusted, improved, or done away with altogether.

First, we should attend the Divine Service to receive God's gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. If we've not been faithful in attending worship to hear the preaching of God's Word, to receive forgiveness and feast on the rich food of our Lord's body and blood for the eternal benefit of our body and soul, we need to repent and come receive the gifts God freely gives. God doesn't want our money. He wants us.

Second, pray for the Lord's help. Our right as a Christian is to speak with our Father, the King of all creation, freely through His Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ. Go to the throne of grace and ask for strength and wisdom to follow His bidding faithfully.

Third, consider what the church is and does. The church is a place of mercy. It inhales the mercy of the Father by the death, resurrection and ascension of His Son through the preaching of the Gospel and the Sacraments. It exhales this mercy in love toward neighbors. Each of us is a member of the church, of God's family. Thus, we are not only recipients of God's mercy, but bearers of that mercy. We spread mercy through the generous giving of our income to support the work of the church in the world.

Fourth, take stock of our current giving in light of the New Testament's teaching on supporting the work of the church. Are we giving our first fruits, or does God get what's left over? Are we giving voluntarily and cheerfully? Are we giving proportionally and generously? The Old Testament required a tithe, or ten percent. The New Testament gives freedom to be generous, to give more for the Church's work. Are we relying on God's promise to provide and increase what we need to do His work? If not, we need to repent. If God gave us His only Son, will He not provide us all things, even physical things? Trust Him, His Word, and heed it.

So, don't let the past define the future. Rather, commit for the year a generous proportion of our income, which is God's gift to us for this body and life.

For the meeting coming up on January 16, LWML will be collecting layette items for Uniondale and Appalachia as we've been doing for years. All these items are so greatly appreciated by those new moms in need. We are blessed with much but so many of our neighbors are in need of basics for their little ones, precious in the eyes of our Lord.

Items: Baby clothing 3-6 months and 6-24 months new or gently used. Sleepers with feet, onesies, 2 piece pant sets, socks, sweaters, hats, mittens, stretchies with feet, baby towels, quilts, small stuffed animals, bottles, dishes and feeding utensils. I am mentioning sizes 3-6 months and 6-24 months specifically since these places are in need of a variety of layette sizes. Especially needed are quilts, sweaters and hats.

A big thank you to everyone who donated for the veteran's collection and to the 80th LWML Anniversary sock collection! During our monthly meeting held on November 21, we collected 178 pairs of men's and ladies socks, well exceeding our goal of 80 pairs, as well as assorted items for the veterans. 100 pairs of socks were delivered to the Mary Brennan Inn in Hempstead in December and the rest of the socks and other items collected for the veterans were delivered to the Veterans Medical Center in Northport.

I want to give you an update of our recent fundraising efforts now that we have some final figures. The Bake-less Cake Sale that started in September raised \$1,198.00 this year. Thank you to Dolores Sartor for spearheading this Bake-less Cake Sale fundraiser!

We've collected \$551.00 in mites for November. The mites collected are from our LWML Sunday push and the regular mites from our members. Thank you to everyone who gave so generously!


