20 Years ago, a few days after Mother's Day, I stood by my mother's bed in the ICU in Mor-



ristown Hospital. She was just a few months short of her 91st birthday. I was there with one of my older brothers, a Deacon in the Catholic Church, a man who knew his Bible as well as I did. We were both privileged to witness my mother going home to heaven. She had brought us up in to know and

serve Jesus, though truthfully, we had both strayed in our life time. Yet the faith that she taught us coupled with the fact that we had been baptized as infants, meant that we were dedicated to the Lord, to serve Him just as my mother had done throughout her life.

Service to others in Jesus' name was my mother's calling. She taught me and my brother to be hospitable and caring. She taught us to minister to those who were hurting as well as the sick and dying, the, grieving and those who were sad and confused. But she was bold in witnessing for the Christian faith. She was never afraid to speak her mind or to confront others who were in sin as well as offer advice to help them to face their difficulties and suffering with the help of Jesus. She was one of the reasons I serve as a Deacon, the same reason why we Deacons Deacon! To serve the Lord as He served us.

One of the first Deacons of the Church, chosen by the Apostles to do the work of church administration, was Stephen. Yet he stepped up to answer the call that the Lord Jesus places on every believer, to preach the gospel, to face the opposition of doubters, scoffers, and those with malice in their hearts, to die for his faith. His example shows us that we Deacons are called to do more than just administer the church: we are called to minister to our Christian brothers and sisters as well as the sick, the hurting, the dying, and the lost. We pledge to fulfill our calling with love, mercy, and compassion.



From the Board of Stewardship

What Do You Want?

One of the best known and most beloved psalms is Psalm 23, the "Shepherd Psalm." There we learn that the Lord is our Shepherd. And since He is our Shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our Shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our Shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we often live as though this is not the case. We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our Shepherd, will not provide for all we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord's sheep.

When do we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd? This happens when we put anything else before Him and His provision for us.

- When we think that going to work is more important than receiving His gifts in church on Sunday (in violation of the First and Third Commandments).
- When we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we don't know what the future will bring (even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters).
- When we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will help themselves.
- When our minds are set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things.

We act this way because we have stopped hearing the call of our Shepherd, which comes through His Word.

Through the Word of God, the Shepherd calls us to Himself. Through the Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through the Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead us to our true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here's the Good News: the Lord is your Shepherd, even and especially for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the Shepherd who lays down His life for His sheep. The Lord is your Shepherd. Let us live as His sheep.

From the Board of Outreach

Do you still get visits from Jehovah Witnesses? Maybe some of your neighbors belong to the Watchtower Society, their governing organization. We have to admire the zeal, determination, and perseverance Jehovah Witnesses manifest as they go from door to door determined to spread their version of the gospel. Such zeal as they display should be manifested by we believers in spreading the good news. But Jehovah Witnesses do what they do for several reasons:

"Jehovah's Witnesses must meet four requirements for salvation: (1) Take in knowledge by studying the Bible with the aid of Watchtower publications, (2) obey the laws of God and the laws of the Watchtower Society, (3) be baptized into the Watchtower organization, and (4) publish the good news of the Watchtower Society from door-to-door." (How to Respond: Jehovah's Witnesses by Hebert Kern)

This is a heretical belief that is the essence of salvation by works. Nowhere do they mention that they do what they do out of love for Jesus or love for the lost.

The Word of God clearly teaches, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2: 8-9). Our salvation is an undeserved gift of God. Witnessing for our Savior, showing mercy, forgiveness, love, and doing other good works are proofs of a saving faith not the cause of it. Jesus alone saves, not Jesus plus good works or good works alone. This is something we must tell them and others in our world who maintain this vain belief that they can earn their way to heaven in some way.





POSITIVELY MARRIED! by Rev. David Elseroad, D.Min., LMFT, Pastoral Psychotherapist

The couple had come for pre-marital sessions. They gazed dewy-eyed at each other, lost in the bliss of their new-found love. Prodded to look at how they communicate with each other, back came the protest heard from many a couple seen for marriage preparation over

the years: "Oh, Pastor, we have no trouble communicating. We never argue, we've never even had a fight. We're too much in love for that!" There was something unreal about that. Just give them time, I thought.

Conflict and disagreement in a marriage are well-nigh inevitable. How could they not be? We're not dealing with clones of one another, but two distinct individuals, each with their own unique personality and background, their own views, needs and wishes. One might think that a happy marriage would be one in which conflict and disagreement were rare or even non-existent. But it isn't so. In fact, the greatest predictor of a lasting, satisfying marriage is not the absence of conflict, but the couple's ability to resolve the conflicts that will inevitably surface. Couples do that in different ways. Some talk out their differences and reach a mutually satisfying compromise. Some avoid their conflicts, agreeing to disagree and never clashing head-on. And some battle it out, the intense energy of their volcanic arguments carried over to affection once they've made up.

Couples do differ in their style of conflict resolution — and even in understanding what a resolution looks like. But more important than actually solving a conflict or problem is feeling good about the interaction. As couples contain and work through negative feelings and actions toward each other and experience positive feelings and interactions, they are maintaining an equilibrium that is critical to their marital health and happiness. That balance, as psychologist and marriage specialist John Gottman has shown in his exhaustive study of married couples, is by no means a 50/50 positive to negative interaction. Rather it is 5 to 1: for every instance of conflict, fighting or negative interaction, there must be five experiences of positive feelings and interaction to sustain a stable and satisfying marriage. Like the pH balance of acidity and alkalinity critical for fertile soil, in the same way the preponderance of warmth, love and fun, expressed in hugging, smiling, complimenting and cooperating, is essential to spouses' growth and commitment in marriage.

Couples locked in patterns of negativity can move out of them. They can look at how they handle disagreements and conflicts, learn how to communicate their thoughts and feelings without resorting to personal attack, contempt, defensiveness or withdrawal, and avert escalation of arguments by monitoring their inner self-talk and practicing self-soothing techniques when feeling overwhelmed. Couples can nurture positive interactions, showing care and concern, affection and appreciation. They can grow in understanding and empathy for one another, renewing or recovering their essential connection of love and respect. In this endeavor spiritual resources can be of great help, with Christian faith a bedrock for newness of personal and conjugal life. "Be kind and compassionate to one another," we are reminded, "forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32); God's grace and empowering Spirit are prime positives! Couples may need help with their change strategy, working with a marital therapist to move from negativity to being "positively married"!
