The Body of Christ

Have you ever thought about the phrase "the body of Christ? It can be understood in many ways. The first way that comes



to mind is the actual flesh and blood that lived and breathed, walked and talked, laughed and cried, suffered and died, who was named Jesus.

The first man God created was named Adam, which means the man, my image, my likeness. His partner was named Eve, meaning mother, creativity. God created them and said he was extremely pleased. It was good! But God was gravely disappointed one day when Adam and Eve became ashamed of their bodies! God realized that he needed a body, so the Holy Spirit blessed a young virgin and the creative process began to form a body for Him, to be known to the world as Jesus.

Jesus was born, baptized, grew into childhood, then manhood, was tempted, bent with compassion, weary from toil, whipped, bound, spat upon, stripped, naked, crowned with thorns, nailed to a cross, died, then after three days, the body of Christ rose from the dead. This was the physical body of Christ.

A second understanding of the body of Christ is the Eucharist. Jesus said to his disciples, "Take and eat. This is my body." He distributed the bread to his disciples on Maundy Thursday. The bread is the body of Christ, his resurrected body. The body of Christ is available to us here and now. Christ's body enters our body so that we become one with the body of Christ.

The third and the standing of the body of Christ, is you, me, everyone who accepts the Lord Jesus, by faith, the body of believers, the church. There is no such thing as an individual Christian. We all are the body of Christ. All of us join together as the body of Christ to worship him and share his love with each other.



The King of Love My Shepherd Is LSB 709

What words do you turn to when you look for comfort in the worst moments of life? What hymns sing those words? It is no secret that the words to Psalm 23 are the go to text for people looking for comfort. There is a no more beloved and beautiful setting of those words than Henry W. Baker's hymn "The King of Love My Shepherd Is," first published in 1861. It has been sung at the funerals of commoners and princesses (e.g. Princess Diana in 1997). Why is it so popular?

Hymns are marriages of text and tune and, when done well, they become a united expression of the Biblical Word and the voice of faith. That is truly the case here. In text and music we sing the blessed words that generations have turned to for comfort, encouragement, and hope.

In the first stanza, the initial verse of the psalm, the Shepherd is given a name—the King of Love. The goodness and grace of this loving King never fail us. Where our intentions and works fail miserably, the Word and the promise of the Lord endure forever. Echoing the words of Paul to the Romans—"If God is for us, who



can be against us" (8:31b)— the hymn reminds us that our confidence lies not in our good works but in the favor of our good and gracious Lord. With more than a simple paraphrase of the text, Baker amplifies the Biblical image. The quiet waters are filled with His life. The ransomed souls of the baptized children of God are given new birth in this living water and led to the rich pastures of His means of grace (the celestial food being a reference to the heavenly meal of Christ's body and blood in the Holy Eucharist).

The third stanza became the final words of its author. Here is the core of the Gospel. In foolish rebellion our first parents exchanged the grace of God for an empty moment that hid only death. Yet we have a loving and gentle Good Shepherd who seeks His lost sheep, leaving even the ninety-nine to seek out and restore the one (Luke 15). The familiar stained glass image of Jesus the Good Shepherd carrying the lamb in His arms is here sung with the joyful voices of the lost restored to their eternal home.

In death the only comfort we can know is the presence of Him who died with us and for us but who lives now to lead and guide us to everlasting life. The cross is the staff of the Good Shepherd. The journey to eternity leads us to the Lord's table, to the healing grace that overflows our cup and fills us with joy even in the midst of sorrow.

The Lord speaks; we listen. And then we respond. For the eternity of the never failing goodness of the Lord we will sing and pray and praise our Good Shepherd—first within the house of the Lord in worship, and then in the eternal dwelling place of God in heaven. We sing this hymn on Sunday, April 21, the Fourth Sunday after Easter, known as Good Shepherd Sunday.



WHEN DID GOD'S LAW BECOME MERE OPINION?

When did greed, coveting, promiscuity, character assassination, violence, and intimidation become our "cultural values?" When did things like these even become entertaining to some? When did "virtue" become such a dirty word? Indeed, it seems that all too often vices have become virtues and virtues have been turned into vices. I realize that all of us are sinful and broken. I also know that it's hard to have these conversations because the finger points back at each one of us. Furthermore, we must all admit that even our best efforts at living morally and virtuously fall short, often when we needed to be at our best. But all of that is not the same as saying that it doesn't matter how we live. Admitting that we all fall short in living out our virtues is not the same thing as suggesting that virtue no longer matters! And the notion that the Laws of God, which are rooted in the reality of His creating and ordering of life for us, are outdated or unnecessary for our wellbeing, is both personally and culturally dangerous.



Amidst all of our present-day rationalizations, here's a truth from Proverbs 6:16-19:

There are six things that the LORD hates, seven that are an abomination to him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that make haste to run to evil, a false witness who breathes out lies, and one who sows discord among brothers.

Godly virtue opposes all of these and a healthy society seeks to mitigate the worst abuses of them. But no society which celebrates what God detests can long endure. Lust, gluttony, greed, sloth (Does anyone even worry about being lazy today?), unrighteous wrath (Just because you are angry doesn't mean you're right!), envy, and pride not only undermine your life and mine, they can even undermine a nation.

It also doesn't matter whether politicians or societal powerbrokers deem such things acceptable. No matter what the leaders of the day think or what popular opinion promotes, God's Word and God's ways will always prevail in the end. Jesus puts all of this in context when He says this to Pontius Pilate about the limits of earthly power, "You would have no power over me if it were not given to you from above" (John 19:11).

Whatever is going on in your life, whatever seems to be going on in our communities or even our culture, remember that all things are ultimately in God's hands. So let's be committed to others in the communities in which we live. For the sake of the culture in which we reside, let us boldly proclaim the whole counsel of God, both His "No" and His "Yes," for all of our good. God's Law wasn't mere opinion when he gave it to Israel, as in today's reading from Exodus, and it isn't now. For all who take it seriously, who are broken by its enduring truth and who then look to God for a salvation that doesn't come by our works, there is forgiveness and salvation by His grace freely given in and through Jesus Christ. Thanks be to God!

In the midst of the brokenness of our culture and for the sake of our proclamation of God's Good News of grace, the message of God's righteous Law needs to be heard now and always. Who will rise to the occasion of proclamation? Could it be you and me? A virtuous people, motivated and empowered by faith, seeks to answer the call to speak God's truth in love (Ephesians 4:15).

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first." You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor's possessions are *his*: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership *to you*? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's will: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since *you* belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.
