"God Bless Our Native Land" LSB 965

Some thoughts for our nation...

Quickly we have come to July 4, the birthday of our nation. It is tempting to sing as many national songs as we can in church. However, we must study the words closely, because we come to church to sing praise to God, while many of these hymns hardly mention Him, or only in passing. So we are careful to choose hymns that rightly praise our Lord, and pray for our country as well. "God Bless Our Native Land" is one such hymn.

The lyrics seem to have originated around 1745, perhaps from a Latin text, although it is uncertain. Appearing initially in English as "God Save the King," Siegfried Mahlmann, a German poet, adapted it for his own country's use. ("God Save Saxony") It was even used during and after the revolution with the text "God Save Great Washington." Later (1834), Charles Brooks of Massachusetts adapted the first verse for use in America, and the text was modified yet again about ten years later by then, well-known musician and writer John Sullivan Dwight (1813-1893), giving us the hymn with which we are now familiar:

God bless our native land! /Firm may she ever stand / Thro' storm and night; / When the wild tempests rave, / Ruler of wind and wave, / Do Thou our country save / By Thy great might.

We call upon God to protect our nation by His almighty power. Surely He who is able to control the weather, the wind and the waves, is able to do this! We recognize, too, that no country can stand by its own strength, for it is not the wisdom and power of human governments which ultimately uphold a nation, but rather it is God's great might. We pray with the confidence that He will use that might in the wisest possible way for the benefit of His redeemed children, His believers in Christ Jesus.

In his Large Catechism, Martin Luther explains well the good habit of praying for the nation because through her God gives us needed blessings. "There is, indeed, the greatest need to pray for temporal authority and government, as that by which most of all God preserves to us our daily bread and all the comforts of this life. For though we have received of God all good things in abundance, we are not able to retain any of them or use them in security and happiness, if He did not give us a permanent and peaceful government. For where there are dissension, strife, and war, there the daily bread is already taken away, or at least checked." (Luther's Small Catechism Lord's Prayer, Fourth Petition, paragraph 74)

The hymn's majestic tune (the origin of which is also unknown) has been quoted in the compositions of many world-famous composers and is the national or royal anthem of over a dozen countries. One can scarcely pray the words without imagining or hearing at the same time the immortal melody.

For her our prayer shall rise / To God above the skies; / On Him we wait. / Thou who art ever nigh, / Guarding with watchful eye, / To Thee aloud we cry, / God save the State!

From the Board of Outreach

"For godly grief produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret, whereas worldly grief produces death." (2 Corinthians 7:10)

Recently I responded to a social media post in which a person explained why he was not a believer in Jesus. It seems the idea that someone would die for his sins was repulsive to him. It made him feel guilt and shame, so he rejected the whole idea along with the rest of God's Word. But, as I pointed out to him, that's exactly what the cross and death of Christ is supposed to do, make us feel guilt, revulsion, and shame over our sinfulness, and cry out to God for mercy. When the Holy Spirit leads, He produces godly sorrow and repentance as Paul says here. Godly sorrow produces repentance which leads to a renewed and deepened relationship with God, a greater zeal to carry out His work on earth.

Strong and honest teaching is needed, teaching through which the Holy Spirit speaks to the heart and convicts of sin. Without such teaching, there will be no change of heart, no awareness of sin and its horrifying nature. Without strong teaching, believers and nonbelievers both will remain content to live in sin, and teach others to do the same. The purpose of warning sinners in strong language that sin will lead to destruction is to make them feel bad about themselves and what they have done, to show sinners that they are totally evil. They need a Savior. They need Jesus.

This, of course, contradicts what our whole culture says. We are told we should not say things that will injure the self-esteem of others, that will bruise their ego or crush their independent spirit. Paul would be flabbergasted by such criticism. He cared about people's feelings to be sure, but he cared more about their souls. He used strong language to make people feel godly sorrow, to lead them to repentance, to lead them to God's offer of reconciliation. You cannot get into heaven without it. We ought to care enough to do the same, confront sin boldly, and just as boldly, tell others of the need for faith in Christ to free them from it.

VOTY - ages, grades 1 though 5 JR and SR Youth - Grade 5 and up


Calling all current youth who have completed grades 8-11 this past June!

The Rewards of Godliness



It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it." (James 2:10) Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God... in Christ Jesus." (Rom. 6:23)

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments:"

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything

against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother') this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land." (Eph. 6:1–3)

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you. (Breaking all the commandments!) That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

Jesus tells us what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life." (Matt. 19:28–29)

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.

Imposter Syndrome

One of the basic components of cognitive behavior therapy (CBT) is that human beings have a tendency to develop irrational and self-deprecating narratives. Through therapy, we can recognize we have the ability to change our self-talk into an empowering narrative. As a therapist who primarily practices CBT, it is often my job to assist clients in recognizing and countering their irrational and unhelpful thoughts.

Have you ever sat in a room and felt like you did not belong? Have you ever been asked a question, given an answer, and then questioned whether or not you are qualified to even answer the question? These irrational thoughts can be challenging to identify and confront. It can become difficult to discern what is true even when others encourage and support our skills. We are our own harshest critics.

This experience is called Imposter Syndrome. It is an inner voice trying to convince you that you do not belong in a space you have worked hard to be in. Imposter syndrome manifests in different ways. Common triggers are a new job, new colleagues, or a newly obtained promotion. It is difficult to admit these feelings because at the core, we are afraid others will find out we really are a fraud.

Studies show that "70% of adults experience Imposter Syndrome at least once in their lifetime," (Psychology Today, 2024).

Whether we are recent grads or seasoned professionals, this can cause anguish and make us feel as if we do not belong and are not qualified.

Imposter syndrome causes individuals to focus on their inadequacies as opposed to their successes. This creates unrealistic standards and leads to unrealistic pressure. In turn, this can impact our mental health and create anxiety or depressive feelings (Weir, 2013).

Unaddressed Imposter Syndrome will not only lead to feelings of incompetence and self-doubt, but also may lead to not taking well-deserved roles or engaging in well-deserved relationships. It can limit your ability for success.

We need to stop the waves of self-doubt. Do not allow them to become a tidal wave that stops us from being productive and reaching our fullest potential.

"Overcoming imposter syndrome involves changing a person's mindset about their own abilities" (Psychology Today, 2024). It is important to engage in positive self-talk related to your role and career. When the thoughts start rolling in and you cannot manage to see your seat at a table, I invite you to change the narrative!

Here are some helpful narratives.

- "I have earned all the necessary tools to be here."
- "I have a unique and helpful perspective on this situation."
- "Acknowledging that I don't know it all, helps me to grow and stay open to learning more."

To the question I ask myself— am I good enough? Michelle Obama offered this advice as far as assuming others are better than we are. "I have been at probably every powerful table that you can think of, I have worked at non-profits, I have been at foundations, I have worked in corporations, served on corporate boards, I have been at G-summits, I have sat in at the U.N. They are not that smart."
