TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's music is all from the eighteenth century, one from Germany, the others from France. I play the French music today, as a nod to July 14, Bastille Day in France, celebrated in France as Americans celebrate July 4.

The music for today, even though from almost the same time, could not be more different. The organ was used in very different ways in Germany and France. In Germany it was all about the hymns; organists played different versions of the hymns for the day, interpreting their meaning in the compositions. In France however, the organ was used in alternation with the choir, playing portions of the chants for the day; the congregation was only a spectator for the service.

During the offering we will hear Johann Sebastian Bach's (1685-1750) setting of "Jesus, Priceless Treasure," our hymn of the day. This piece is from Bach's *Orgelbuechlein* or little organ book. This is a collection of 46 settings of hymns that appeared in 1714. The collection is a testament to Bach's career as a parish organist and were quite possibly written as examples for other composers to follow. Each piece uses incredible creativity and compositional skill in setting the mood of each hymn. Bach inscribed that collection "for the glory of God and the edification of my neighbor."

The rest of today's music is from France, "Suite du deuxieme ton" by Louis-Nicolas Clerambault (1676-1749). The French assembled their church music by key, or *ton*, so that it could be used with the key of the chants for a certain day. Originally the music would be strictly based on the chant melody, but as time went on, it began to resemble more of the dances of the day, as is the case here. While the Germans used the hymn melody as the title of the piece, the French named their pieces by the sounds the organist was to use in playing them.

Who were the better organists, the French or the Germans? Both were excellent in their own ways, however, the story is told of an organ competition between Bach, and another French organist of the day, Louis Marchand. It is said that Marchand snuck in to hear Bach practicing at night, sizing up his competitor. When he heard Bach play, he quickly got out of town, before the competition took place. French or German, you be the judge.
