

many people still look with hope on the new year, feeling energized by a fresh calendar that presents fresh opportunities.

The problem for so many, however, is when that initial enthusiasm wears off -when you're forced to wake up on a cold February morning to go to the gym or when some-body brings you donuts from your favorite shop - your aspirations for a healthier lifestyle seem to fade with every passing temptation. Maybe illness gets in the way and your aspiration for perfect weekend attendance at church has gone by the wayside, or you've had to deplete your new savings plan already because of unexpected expenses. Even those without resolutions have perhaps found that their desire for this year to be different seems like a silly ambition already.

The thing that unites all of these is that enthusiasm alone doesn't yield positive results. If wishing for change was all it took, we would all be changed already. Those few people still going with their 2025 goals - less than 20 percent - how do they do it? How do they keep going?

At this point in the book of Numbers, Israel has made a habit of turning away from God. And in chapter 25, they continue that trend: they start worshiping the Gods of the local people and follow them instead. Instead of allowing the people to lose their identity as the people of God and throw the mission to the Promised Land completely into chaos, God does what God has been doing since Genesis 1: making order out of chaos. The following chapters of Numbers show God counting, organizing and creating structures to help accomplish the mission. People were allocated land based on the size of their groups, the clans were united according to their ancestors and therefore given clear identity, and the inheritance structures were made to include women and siblings, not just firstborn sons (yes, the book of Numbers was progressive).

As we seek to be the people God made us to be, don't consider it a failure of God if our problems are not magically fixed. Instead, create lasting structures around the changes you would like to see, following this example of God in the Bible.

The last piece: involve God in this process. If something is important to us, it is also important to God, but we can also listen for discernment as we seek to align ourselves with God's kingdom. Prayerfully, diligently, we can make changes in ourselves and our world.

"For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord. "They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope." Jeremiah 29:11



February 2 – The Presentation of Our Lord

If I were to say what happens on February 2, most of you would say Groundhog's Day. However, I would say, The Presentation of Our Lord! This year, the day that the church sets aside for this celebration falls on a Sunday, and we get to celebrate it! That makes me very happy, because what a festival day it is! What is the day that we call The Presentation of Our Lord? It is the day, 40 days after Christmas, that Mary and Joseph bring Jesus to the temple, as prescribed by Jewish law, as told to us in Luke 2. There the baby Jesus is seen by the prophet Simeon, promised by God not to die before seeing the Messiah and the prophetess Anna. On seeing the baby, Simeon sings the ancient song of the church that we call the Nunc Dimittis, "Lord, now let your servant depart in peace," a hymn we continue to sing each week after communion.

The observance of this festival dates back to the earliest days of the Christian church, having been celebrated in Jerusalem already in the fourth century, making it almost as old as the celebration of Christmas itself. In England, it marked the end of the Christmas season, and the greens and decorations for Christmas would be removed. In many traditions, it is often called Candlemas, because during this festival the candles that would be used for the coming year in the church would be blessed, some being distributed to the congregation as well, who would form processions into the town with



these candles, remembering Simeon's words that Christ is a "Light to lighten the Gentiles." The connection to Groundhog's Day is also not coincidental, as an old English saying says: If Candlemas Day is clear and bright, winter will have another bite. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, winter is gone and will not come again." The Pennsylavania Dutch brought Groundhog's Day to America, which was purposely celebrated on the Feast of the Presentation. We can see the connection to light in the two celebrations, light being a central theme of the Presentation.

This day, a highlight of the Epiphany season, will bring us back to the infant Jesus, and on February 2 a little Christmas will be back at Trinity. We will have not only hymns for the Presentation, but some Christmas hymns as well. Trinity Choir at 9:00am will proclaim the words of Simeon, the Nunc Dimittis, in a beautiful setting by early 20th century Irish composer, Charles Villiers Stanford. As a congregation, we will sing Simeon's words as well, using the words of Luther in his hymn based on Simeon's words, "In Peace and Joy I Now Depart," which was published in the first Lutheran hymnal in 1524, a hymnal that just celebrated its 500th anniversary. You don't have to put up a Christmas tree or take out all of your Christmas decorations again to celebrate the Presentation, but if you haven't taken them down yet, you can say that you were following ancient church custom. Christmas will be back, at least for one day in February at Trinity. Merry Christmas! Here is a recording of Stanford's Nunc Dimittis in C that Trinity Choir will sing:

"Christ's Life, and Love, and Light"

Open our eyes Lord to see Your love's intent, To know with minds and hearts its depth and height May thankfulness be days in service spent Reflection of Christ's life, and love, and light. (LSB 788)

As stewards enter the month of February, it is fitting that we look at the last stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788). It is in these words that we see that the heart of stewardship is indeed love. Love has flowed from our Lord to us in the person and work of Jesus Christ. This love is then to flow from us to others. Being a conduit of love is really the central task of what it means to be a steward. The Lord entrusts us with His love that reconciles us to Himself, so that we might be stewards of the Gospel reconciliation that is freely given through us to those around us.

If we don't see this love from God to us, then through us, to others, our eyes will be closed not just to the needs of those around us. They will also be closed to the very heart of the Gospel itself. This is why the hymnist prays that the Lord would "Open our eyes, Lord, to see Your love's intent, To know with minds and hearts its depth and height."

Only when we are immersed in God's Holy Word, washed in Holy Baptism's life-giving water and fed on the holy, precious, body and blood of Jesus in the Holy Supper, will the Spirit be able to open our eyes to see the Lord's loving intent for us, and those we know and love. Sin blinds us. It makes us think that we are the center of our world, and our pleasure is the key.

In the Word, the Lord shows us the depth and height of His love. The depth of that love is what moved Him from His throne in heaven into our world. There He would don our human flesh, walk the dusty roads of Palestine, and set His face toward Jerusalem. Once there we get to see the height of His love, as He is elevated on a Roman cross to die a death that we deserve. But that would not be the end. He would be lowered into a tomb for three days. On that third day we then see the heights of love ascended to in His resurrection. This resurrection is already ours too!

The depth and height of this love poured out on us by the Holy Spirit then is distributed through us to others. Christ's servant love is shown in our servant love. The hymn utters the prayer of every Christian steward:

May thankfulness be days in service spent

Reflection of Christ's life, and love, and light.

This is the task for which stewards were originally created. Bearing the image of creation and redemption, we reflect Christ's love to those around us. The light of Christ shining through us to others is the true stewardship to which we are called. It takes place in our homes. It is lived out in our workplaces and classrooms. As we bear the life, love and light received in Word and Sacrament, we carry it out in service to our neighbor and for the glory of God!

Forgive us, Lord, when our stewardship of thankfulness is shallow or lacking! Fill us with Your life, love and light! Not just for us, but through us to those we know and love, that they may know Your life, love and light for them!

Early Childhood Center Update

Introducing STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) education in preschool classrooms lays the foundation for critical thinking, problem-solving, and creativity from an early age. Young children are naturally curious, and hands-on STEM activities foster exploration, experimentation, and a love for learning. By engaging in simple science experiments, building structures, and exploring technology through interactive play, preschoolers develop essential skills such as observation, reasoning, and collaboration.

A great example of this was our **Preschool Snow Ball Castle Building STEM Challenge**, where children designed and built structures to enclose their polar bears inside. Through this fun and engaging activity done during our January Arctic Animals lessons, they explored engineering concepts, tested different materials, and learned about stability and balance. This challenge encouraged teamwork, perseverance, and creative problem-solving - key skills

Early exposure to STEM concepts not only prepares children for future academic success but also nurtures innovation and adaptability - key traits in our ever-evolving world. Investing in STEM education at the preschool level ensures that young learners grow with the confidence and curiosity needed to become tomorrow's problemsolvers and innovators.





Do You Value Yourself Enough?

I'm guessing that many of us don't value ourselves enough. Someone may be thinking, "I doubt that! I know lots of people with big egos who seem to value themselves too much." Or someone else may be thinking, "God doesn't want us to self-righteously overvalue ourselves. God wants us to be humble and confess our faults and sins." But I'm thinking that God wants most of us to value ourselves more.

There's no doubt about how much God values each one of us! The whole Bible and countless verses in it testify to that foundational truth. God, our Creator, who created us in God's own image, says, "Can a mother forget the baby at her breast and have no compassion on the child she has borne? Though she may forget, I will not forget you! See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands." (Isaiah 40:15-16) Jesus, of course, is the ultimate proof of how much we are valued by God. Before his suffering and death for us Jesus said, "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love" (St. John 15:9).

This is the core value that every human being is born with. You are precious, unique, of infinite and eternal and unchanging value, good, beautiful, lovable, and full of potential. And nothing and no one can take your core value from you, or diminish it the least little bit (see Romans 8:35-39). But we can get out-of-touch with our core value – lose sight of it – who we are as a child of God. And that can get us into a lot of trouble.

When we lose our temper or have a burst of anger ... or when we strike out at our spouse in the midst of a highly emotional argument ... or when we lose control of an addiction of one kind or another ... or when we are feeling depressed or feeling over-anxious about something ... or when we're feeling very resentful toward someone whom we feel has mistreated us ... those are all signs that WE ARE NOT VALUING OURSELVES ENOUGH.

Anger, anxiety, and other out-of-control negative emotions and thoughts are often automatic coping defenses our human minds use to help us cope with core hurts we are experiencing. Those core hurts (like feeling powerless or not-good-enough or unlovable or shame or worthless, etc.) are too painful for us to feel very long. Believing these core hurts obviously means that we are devaluing ourselves. They separate us from our core value. So our minds – to help us handle our core hurts – automatically protect us with those negative thoughts, emotions and behaviors – often called a "fight or flight" response. And too often those responses are not in our best interest or helpful in our relationships.

The solution is to learn how to self-regulate our emotions. Easier said than done! But it is possible to train our minds to automatically go to our personal core value when our core hurts are triggered. And that automatically takes us to a place of healing and compassion – for ourselves and toward others.

I've learned about what I'm sharing here from Dr. Steven Stosny, a well-known psychologist who has treated over 6,000 people with anger, resentment, and other relationship problems. He has developed a therapeutic process which can train our brain to self-regulate our emotions in this way. I use it myself and help others to learn it. Many have found it beneficial. It includes creating a personal Core Value bank for yourself. As you make withdrawals from time to time, the marvelous thing is that the balance never goes down from this bank. (You may want to pick up one of Dr. Stosny's many books, like "Soar Above: How to Use the Most Profound Part of Your Brain Under Any Kind of Stress".)

Most of us don't want our lives centered around our core hurts and negative thinking and emotions – a weak mode-of-self. We want our lives centered in our God-given core value – a power mode-of-self. One of our goals at the Lutheran Counseling Center is to assist individuals, couples and families, learn to do just that.


