O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright LSB 395

I am excited, because this year we will be celebrating the festival of the Epiphany, normally observed on January 6, on Sunday, January 5. What is Epiphany and the Epiphany season that follows? Epiphany is the celebration of the coming of the Wise Men to see Jesus. Epiphany comes from the Greek word for "to be visible" and can mean the shining of a light, or a manifestation or revelation. Christmas was about Jesus as fully human—a baby son born to Mary and laid in a manger. But Epiphany is about a Jesus who is also fully divine—the Son of God. Epiphany is one of the oldest of church festivals, along with Easter and Pentecost. It had its beginnings in the third century, (Christmas was not a church festival until the 5th century). This season is where we hear so many facets of Christ's Godliness, each facet reflecting the light of his divinity – His Baptism, His miracles and His Transfiguration.

One of the Epiphany hymns that we will be singing on January 5is "O Morning Star How Fair and Bright." (LSB 395) It is known as the "Queen of Chorales" because of the majesty of its text and tune. Its message of hope in the face of death is incomparable. (By the way, there is a King of Chorales as well - "Wake, Awake, For Night is Flying," (LSB 516) also by Nicolai, but that's another newsletter article to come.)

When Philipp Nicolai wrote the words and melody to this hymn, in 1597, he was a German Lutheran pastor in the city of Unna in Westphalia, Germany. While there, the city was hit by a scourge of plague that took the lives of more than 1,300 of its citizens. This widespread death so close to home impacted Nicolai in a profound way. It has been noted that more than once up to 30 graves were dug for those claimed by the rat-and-flea-borne menace, and these were laid to rest within the sight of his house, which overlooked the graveyard.

From this catastrophe, which must have struck terror in the lives of anyone near its march, Nicolai found inspiration in four different scriptures. One of these came from Zechariah's prophecy in Luke 1. Here is John the Baptist's father, filled with the Holy Spirit and speaking exuberantly about Jesus, after being silenced by the angel Gabriel for his previous unbelief. In Luke 1, beginning at verse 76, Zechariah sings,

"And you, Child, will be called the Prophet of the Most High; for You will go before the Lord to prepare His ways, to give knowledge of salvation to His people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

How comforting the words of Zechariah must have been to the hymn-writer. All around him, encroaching nearer, death was spreading over the city. Left and right, Nicolai's parish members were being claimed by this horrific disease, dying terrible deaths as their organs failed and their bodies shut down. And in the middle of this devastation, God's Word speaks. The Promised One has come; His arrival brings the knowledge of salvation, the forgiveness of sins, and a light to those who sit in darkness. Each of the hymns six verses speak to Christ being with us, giving us life. As his parishioners lost their lives, Nicolai's hymn reminded all that, Christ gives life; he is with us today, tomorrow and every day. Is there anything more comforting than to know our Savior is always with us?

What joy to know, when life is past, the Lord we love is first and last, the end and the beginning! He will one day, oh, glorious grace, transport us to that happy place beyond all tears and sinning! Amen! Amen! Come, Lord Jesus!

The hymn will even be included in the Trinity Choir anthem for the day, "Canticle for Epiphany" by Paul Weber. Here is a link to hear the anthem:

Repenting of "Feasts that Know No Fast"

Fresh off the Christmas season and the retail frenzy that accompanies it, January brings a shot of frigid air into the lives of the people we know and love. This is not a meteorological statement either. While it is true that January is one of the colder months for those in North America, the cold front blast that hits us is the full force of credit card spending that fueled the retail frenzy. The bills for the gifts, the parties, the food and the travel have now come due. The credit card makes things convenient, but it also requires more discipline than many can muster. When the bills come in January for December's celebration, it really puts a damper on things.

Congregations often make the same mistake in stewardship. We often charge forward in doing what we always do or starting new endeavors without counting the cost. But at the end of the month, or the end of year, when the bill comes due, the red ink on the congregational balance sheet smacks the people in the face like a stiff north wind in January. We hunkered down. We circle the wagons. We start to panic. The work of the Gospel suffers.

The fifth verse of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) addresses this January situation. The words penned by William Watkins Reid are very needful for us to hear as we start a new year, while dealing with the bills of past efforts and expense.

"Forgive us, Lord for feast that knows not fast ..." This hits us hard, doesn't it? We love when the money is flowing, the parties are going, and things are getting bigger and better. But there is a time in life, and most especially in our spiritual disciplines, that we need to fast. The purpose of a fast is to step back, lay something aside for a time, and replace it with meditation on Scripture and prayer. This is designed to keep us from turning something that may well be good into an idol that separates us from the God who loves us in Christ.

"For joy in things that meanwhile starve the soul ..." In "The Parable of the Sower," we hear Jesus talk about how the worries and cares of life choke out the growth of the seed of the Word that was planted. We know how this happens in our lives. Professional and youth sports do this. Materialism does this. Travel and leisure and do this. There is a list of things that we enjoy that starve the soul.

But it also happens in our congregations. When corporate stewardship is not managed in a responsible way, it can and does destroy individual stewardship. Is it good individual stewardship to support a ministry that doesn't take its corporate responsibility seriously?

"For walls and wars that hide your mercies vast and blur our vision of the Kingdom goal." This is the ultimate end of the idolatry of failed stewardship. We build walls between believers within the church and hamper those who are outside from coming to the Light of Life that is Jesus. The wars we fight over money and its impact on ministry do the same. It eventually blurs our vision of what we are here to do: share the Good News of Jesus. When the wintry blast of January hits us in this fashion, we are called to repent.

When the Holy Spirit uses the cold front of the call to repentance, we meet the God who forgives and restores. That is what He does for individual and corporate stewards. When the bills hit, they call us back to Jesus. He is the One who indeed forgives us our shallow thankfulness and leads us into the bounty of His mercy yet again.

Outreach Ministry

When the Jews went into exile in Babylon, among first group of exiles were young men of prominent Jewish families: Daniel, Meshach, Shadrach and Abednego. Life was difficult for them for the Babylonian culture was polytheistic. Babylonians were eclectic in their worship. They worshipped a host of other gods but did not tolerate the Jews who served only one.

Like the Jewish exiles in Babylon modern Christians dwell amidst a host of alternative religions which all claim to explain the hidden mysteries of the universe as well as foretell the future, all co-existing in a bizarre harmony. Daniel and his companions stood firm in their faith in Yahweh and suffered for it. Yet they preserved and were blessed.

We modern believers should stand fast in our faith in Jesus because He is God. Our God is God Almighty, the one Who created and controls all things. In spite of the grand and impressive works and claims made by those in the world who do not know Jesus, He is the only God. All the so-called gods of the world are false and demonic in origin yet the culture in which we live proclaims their doctrines daily through the media as well as through academia. The message is proclaims tolerance and acceptance of all religions as equal, a message so that appears do loving and kind, that it could fool even the one who has faith in Jesus.

Therefore, we Christians must be grounded daily in the Word of God. In this way we will be steeped in God's wisdom and truth, so we will be able to discern the lies of the devil from the truth of God. Then we will be equipped to counteract the claims of the devotees of those Satanic phony gods. Armed with the truth, we then can spread the gospel to free those in bondage to Satan.




Early Childhood Center Update

As always, our goal is honoring God and living according to His will. We invite the ladies of





Comfort Dog Ministry









The Winter Blues

As the days grow shorter and daylight decreases many people start to notice a change in their mood and a decrease in their energy level. Some days it can be challenging to get out of bed when it is dark and cold. This is known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) and it is a type of depression.

SAD happens during certain seasons of the year, most often fall or winter. It is thought that shorter days and less daylight may set off a chemical change in the brain leading to symptoms of depression. Our mood and energy are changed by shorter days and decreased daylight.

There are several things we can do to lessen the impact and duration of depressive episodes, so we can get back to our life and actually enjoy the changing of the seasons. Some helpful and proactive suggestions include:

- Go outside every day, walk, sit in the grass and look at the sky.
- Be intentional and focus on positive information *via* social media.
- Attend church, pray, meditate and hear the Good News!
- Drink cold water, use ice and add a twist of mint or lemon.
- Clean or organize something for 15 minutes a drawer, a countertop, make your bed.
- Listen to music, something upbeat with energy. Sing at the top of your voice. Dance!
- Watch something funny, laughing lifts our mood.
- Make food because treating depression involves nourishing your body with healthy food.
- Make something draw, paint, color, create.
- Reach out to a loved one, talk to a stranger and actively seek out human connection.
- Listen to someone else, volunteer because helping helps you!
- Cuddle with your pets, talk to them and tell them your troubles.
- Light therapy and antidepressants can help treat SAD.
- Make an appointment to meet with a professional therapist.

If you or a loved one is experiencing symptoms of depression and it is not improving after two weeks, it is important to seek treatment. The Lutheran Counseling Center offers faith-based counselors, available virtually and at some locations in person.
